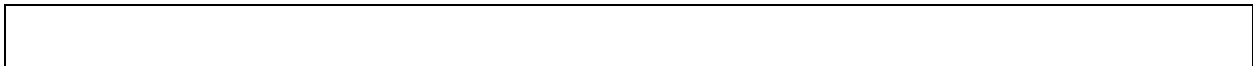

Questions:

Response:

My name is Ye Jin, and I'll quickly answer your questions! I am a recent graduate, and I work in the Tyler Admissions Office. I received a BFA in painting with Entrepreneurial Studies with a Minor in Art History.

- Students applying for a BFA degree don't actually need to choose a department to apply to! Everyone is admitted as an undeclared major, and you go through the foundation courses in your freshman year that allow you to experience lots of techniques and processes. Sophomore year you can take studio electives that can help you choose your major. I think it's important to explore and see what your options are, so if anything it may be useful to have an open mind!
- Tyler professors have all been very welcoming and understanding of each student's individual needs. The curriculum allows students to be very self-directed and participate in a way best suited to their learning needs.
- Tyler's community is the most important aspect. Artists especially lean on each other and it is a great place to meet those people. Post-grad I've been realizing this more and more.
- I lived off-campus for 3 years, and I never felt it was particularly dangerous. I would say be alert and aware and there are precautions you can take like the walking escorts and night shuttle bus. On-campus, I've always felt safe walking around at all hours.
- I was actually an international student, so definitely not from Philly or the country! I think it would be a new experience that needs adjusting to no matter where you're from. Explore the city and campus with friends (safely, following pandemic policies), and get used to the new environment!
- Like I mentioned before, you'll have plenty of opportunity to experiment with other materials and processes. Most majors you'll have space in your schedule to continue to take studio electives in your junior and senior year.

How safe would you say the campus is?

We are located in a large urban city, so students are always advised to be aware of their surroundings. In general our campus is very safe! We have Temple Police officers and safety guards that drive around campus 24/7 as well as call boxes and bright lights all over campus so students are not getting around in the dark. We also have an 'Owl Bus' system that will drive you home if you are feeling unsafe.

What are some things potential students who aren't from Philadelphia should be aware of?

We are located north of Center City and have a large, but tight knit campus within the city. Our students come from all over the world and we are one of the most diverse colleges in the US! Students who do not want to live on campus can live elsewhere easily as we have our own subway stop and rail station close by for commuters. We have 17 different schools on campus within the Temple Community, which makes it easy to take classes outside of the school you're attending.

When applying to a specific program at Tyler are students able to experiment with other mediums or are they locked into one type of class?

We are a school that highlights interdisciplinary studies! Students do not choose their major until their junior year, leaving lots of time for play and exploration into all of our different studios. Once a student majors, they are still able to continue using other practices and taking classes outside of their major.

What would you recommend when applying to Tyler?

We recommend making sure you get all of your application materials in before the deadline of February 1st. You will need to apply via the Common App to Temple/Tyler, open your TUPortal account (this is prompted by an email after your application is submitted), submit your Self Reported High School Transcripts, and submit a portfolio via Slideroom if applying to a studio art major. You can always reach out to us in admissions with questions!

What is something a student should keep in mind when choosing a department to apply to?

You do not choose a specific major when applying to Tyler's BFA programs. If you are looking at our other offerings such as Architecture, Art Ed, Art Therapy, Visual Studies or Art History, you should keep in mind that your first year requirements are slightly different from the BFA program and to really think about if you may want to be in one of those majors early on.
